# **OLD HOGS NEW TRICKS**

Bad Pig makes its mark with customs that anyone can afford.



f you just drove by the two nondescript buildings in Oak Park, you would never guess what Bad Pig Customs has been building since 2013. Seeing an underserved hole in the market, Bad Pig has specialized in repairing, rebuilding and customizing Harleys for the average Joe.

"We get all sorts of guys who have an older bike, one they got from their father, or one they've been riding for years," reflects Mark Zagacki. "These guys don't want to go out and spend a ton of money on a new bike, they just want their bike made better".

What makes Bad Pig unique is that they have their own parts shop, and we're not talking about chrome doo-dads and overpriced clothes, either. "I've been in the parts business since December 2012 as *Oak Park Mark's*, and we currently have over 5,800 square feet of retail space devoted to everything from wheels and bars to frames and engines," says Mark. Having this enormous resource of new and used parts at their disposal, Bad Pig can sell the parts without including the markup of a middleman. "It's really the base that brought the business to the next level, and we attend the biggest motorcycle swap meets in southeast Michigan and northern Ohio on a monthly basis."

Having the parts is a great resource, but it's what they do with them that really sets Bad Pig apart. Teaming with co-owner Dave Foster's crew to do the custom work, they have a real knack for breathing new fire into old bikes.

"We can repair anything, but what we really love doing is putting work into that 10- to 15-year-old cycle and giving people a one-of-a-kind custom for a fraction of the price of a new bike. Anything from paint, fairings and bags to complete engine and transmission swaps, we can give a bike all the modern upgrades that weren't available back in the day when it rolled off the Motor Company's production line."

Sometimes, that "retrofit" even works in reverse. Dave told us, "Our latest project is a 2017 Rushmore Road Glide that the customer wanted built with every bell and whistle, but it's stuff that the aftermarket doesn't even produce for this model yet. We ended up pulling the engine, dropping in a S&S 143cid and Baker Drive Train 6-Speed Grudge Box transmission, and adding everything from a Big Bear Choppers inverted front-end assembly to Brembo's and Ohlins shocks. Not only will this bike rip with about 160 horsepower out of the box, it's gonna carve and stop on a dime. Top that with flat black tins and gold accents, he'll have a bike NOBODY at the local Bike Night can touch."

While they enjoy doing these high-end customs, Dave's true passion is builds for everyday riders. "I love the older bikes, from Shovelheads and Panheads to your basic Softtail. I want to fix some guy's Harley that's been gathering dust, or replace an old 88 twin-cam with a modern engine. Combine that foundation with some custom paint and a few select accessories, and you've got a one-of-a-kind bike that doesn't cost an arm and a leg." With over fifty years of combined experience on the shop floor, if you can dream it up, Bad Pig Customs can create it.

When asked about how the business is doing, Mark smiles. "Well, we ain't gonna get rich anytime soon, but we're giving people what they want and we love what we do. We don't have to answer to "corporate," and we get to do everything on our terms. Hell, when

the photographer for this article asked if we wanted to bring the bikes to a studio, we just laughed. We make these bikes in a garage with eight lifts and parts all over the place. THAT'S where we wanted them shot."

Based on the bikes, it's safe to say their philosophy is working. If you've always wanted a custom Harley, but didn't think you could swing it—Bad Pig Customs is the place for you.

House Bill 4843 creates a pilot program to let veterans train their own service dogs. It's pending in the House Military and Veterans Affairs Committee.

HB 5616-5617: Creates a toll-free hotline for veterans and their families to report cases of abuse at veterans' homes and require the veterans' facility ombudsmen to work with the Department of Health and Human Services to investigate complaints.

#### New Grand Rapids veterans home site plan approved with conditions

Plans for a new \$49 million Grand Rapids Home for Veterans took another step forward despite hitting a snag with the site plan. City commissioners voted unanimously to change the zoning of the property at 3000 Monroe Ave. NW near 3 Mile Road to accommodate the facility. In turn, the vote approved the site plan, but with a condition that the architects address concerns regarding the site's proximity to a neighboring property.

"The sticking point is this piece with proximity to the neighbor and this buffering and that opportunity to make some minor modifications to increase that buffer in some way, or at least give us assurance that that has been addressed," said Mayor Rosalynn Bliss.

The affected neighbors, Paul and Carol V'Soske, were outspoken Tuesday during a city commission meeting at Oakdale Park Christian Reformed Church. The couple said they were not notified of the project, and expressed concerns about the site's proximity to their 3 Mile Road home, and the damage that the project would cause to land Paul V'Soske believes to be protected wetlands.

"This has been a piece of property we've been privileged to be stewards of for 38 years," Paul V'Soske said. "All we're looking for is a good neighbor and the way it was laid on us did not give us that feeling.

Officials also said they rerouted the access drive from 3 Mile Road, moved the proposed parking, and plan to shift the site to provide an additional buffer between the properties in response to neighbor concerns.

At its closest point, the roadway coming off 3 Mile Road is less than 10 feet from the V'Soskes' property. City Planning Director Suzanne Schulz suggested that the architects add 5-10 feet for a more desirable buffer.

The approval from the city commission was an important step to assure the project didn't lose out on highly competitive federal grant funding, which is expected to fund about 60 percent of the project. Construction is expected to begin late summer or early fall 2018, Redford said.

#### Court determines military burn pits caused lung disease in service members

The thousands of U.S. military personnel and private contractors whose health was compromised by the dense black smoke of burn pits - and who were then denied proper treatment - may finally be vindicated by a recent court ruling.

A judge under the U.S. Department of Labor's Office for Workers' Compensation Programs decreed that open-air burn pits -- where thousands of chemicals were released into the air after trash and other waste were incinerated at American

military bases in Iraq and Afghanistan -- are connected to lung disease, Fox News has learned.

The decision marks a victory for the nearly 64,000 active service members and retirees who have put their names on a burn pit created by the Veterans Administration, bringing them one step closer to getting adequate medical coverage, something that has never been guaranteed. Private contractors who were also exposed to the burn pit toxins also have been denied coverage.

"This case has legitimized the disease," former contractor Veronica Landry of Colorado Springs, whose case was a part of the recent ruling, told Fox News. "There are many people out there who are still not getting the treatment they need. "This ruling changes that."

#### Ludington veteran learns to use donor arms

A northern Michigan veteran is recovering at a Baltimore hospital after receiving a rare transplant. In 2012, U.S. Army national guard Sergeant Eric Lund lost both of his arms above the elbow after an IED explosion hit his convoy in Afghanistan. Countless surgeries, prosthetics and two purple hearts later, Eric received the call he's been waiting two years for.

Within hours, he was on a plane and prepping for surgery. Eric's extensive bilateral surgery took more than twelve hours. He is the second person to receive a double arm transplant at Johns Hopkins Hospital.

Eric has been working directly with physical therapists at John Hopkins for several hours each day. For months Eric will continue therapy working on stretching and training his muscles and nerves to communicate with one another. Since the surgery Eric and his mother have been living near the hospital in a handicap accessible apartment.

# The Motorcycle Lawyer on THE LAW

# It Was the Motorcyclist's Fault! (said the defense attorney) LITIGATING CONTESTED LIABILITY MOTORCYCLE CRASHES

I have, perhaps, litigated more motorcycle injury and wrongful death accident cases than any other individual attorney in the state of Michigan. It has been my experience that defense attorneys will do just about anything to point the finger at the motorcycle victim, thus escaping or reducing the likelihood of having to pay fair compensation, if any at all.

One reason behind this is based on a legal doctrine called comparative negligence. If this type of defense is used, a jury would need to assign a percentage of fault (negligence), as it relates to the drivers involved in the crash. For every percent of negligence the jury places on the motorcyclist, the corresponding amount is subtracted from the damages awarded. In other words, the more they can fault the motorcyclist, the less they are required to pay. Additionally, here in Michigan, we have what is referred to as the 50% Rule. If the defense can make the jury believe the motorcyclist is more than 50% at-fault, the biker loses their case. They would not receive any non-economic damages, meaning restitution, for pain and suffering, scarring, disfigurement or other injuries.

One of the most common crash scenarios occurs at an intersection when the defendant driver (in a car) turns left, directly in front of a motorcyclist coming from the opposite direction who has the right-of-way. In Michigan, there is a statute that states a motorist gives up their right-of-way if they were speeding at or through an intersection. Perhaps not so surprisingly, there have been a few occasions in which I believe the defendant driver was coached to state that it was their perception that the motorcyclist was going over the speed limit.

As one might assume, combining this argument with this statute can wreak havoc within an intersection case. Following this line, the defense could then argue comparative negligence and reduce a percentage of the damages.

#### **Biases and Prejudices**

Whenever I try a motorcycle case to a jury, I talk to them afterwards to get their feelings and reasons for deciding the case. Similarly, on any substantial injury case that I try, we host a focus group where we test these issues with ten laypeople from the county where the case is being tried. These sessions help us to learn what evidence a typical juror finds most important, as well as the reasoning they use in deciding the case. Based on what we have learned so far, it is apparent folks have strong opinions about motorcyclists, specifically the types of motorcyclists that are on the road, how motorcyclists drive and the usage of helmets (or lack thereof). Some people feel that just by riding a motorcycle, getting injured in a crash "comes with the territory."

There tends to be a certain bias or prejudice from laypeople, therefore, that most motorcyclists are simply behind the eight ball from the start. The feedback is clear, however, on the topic of helmet use: regardless of the law, laypeople feel that choosing to not wear a helmet is not a smart thing and would cause them to assign comparative negligence, if there was any injury involving the motorcyclist's head.

#### The Need for Speed?

The defense will typically try almost anything they can to make it seem as

though the motorcyclist was speeding. I have even heard the ludicrous argument that, if the motorcyclist was going 5 mph less, the crash would not have happened, because the motorcyclist would have been a couple hundred yards away from the intersection. Based on this ridiculous argument, the driver turning left, directly in front of him, would have already made her turn and been well out of the way.

It would be like saying, "If the motorcyclist stopped for a cup of coffee, which took 15 minutes, the crash would not have happened." The driver making the left turn had a duty to see what there was to be seen. They miscalculated oncoming traffic, encroached on the motorcyclist's lane, and failed to yield the right-of-way. If the negligent car driver had just waited to ensure there was enough room to make a left turn, the crash would not have happened.

#### Re Proactive

Start by taking a motorcycle safety class and practice with a riding skills class. Be sure your driver's license includes a motorcycle endorsement, always wear the appropriate safety gear and make your motorcycle conspicuous. I love when I can point out to the defendant driver that the light configuration on the front of my client's motorcycle includes two, big, white LED head lamps as well as two amber running lights, which also serve as turn signals. I ask, "You're telling us that you did not see all of these lights?"

The people that sit as jurors are just like everyone else, they have biases, prejudices and opinions. We all do. It's part of what makes us human. Unfortunately, most laypeople's biases held towards motorcyclists lean more toward negative. It will be easier for your attorney to argue that you are a safe and experienced motorcycle rider if you take the initiative and obtain solid riding experience.

The plaintiff rests.



This month's adventure took me down the road of what it takes to get your CPL (concealed pistol license) certification. It is always something I have thought of doing, and I realize the controversy that goes along with this choice.

I teamed up with three ladies I work with at Serendipity Hair Design in Belmont, Michigan. One of their fathers-in-law is a certified instructor and owns River City Concealed Carry in the Grand Rapids area.

To acquire your CPL, you are required to do a day of classroom work and pass a written test, then spend a couple hours actually shooting. I was amazed at everything we learned; not just about gun safety and how to shoot, but there are many laws regarding carrying a gun and personal protection. Gary Dredge was extremely knowledgeable about every aspect of teaching and training us.

Choosing to carry a gun is a responsibility and it is important that you understand the consequences. Once we were cleared to shoot at the range, we did a refresher of the classroom teachings, chose the guns we wanted to shoot, and got to it. He guided us through basic shooting and defensive shooting skills, called out commands for us to follow and watched us closely. We portrayed real-life scenarios and what to do when you only have seconds to decide. The range shooting got us comfortable with our firearms and defending ourselves in various situations should they ever arise.

If you are contemplating getting your CPL, or just want to feel more comfortable and knowledgeable about firearms and laws, I highly recommend Gary Dredge at River City Concealed Carry. I am very glad to have completed the course!

bus picks us up from the hotel and away we go.







# HISTORY OF FOUR-WHEEL DRIVE

PART III OF A SERIES



#### **Technical Differences**

With their modestly increased ground clearance, off-road tires, simple rigid-axle suspension, and family car power output levels, the first crop of off-road sedans used the advantage of four-wheel drive to enable them to stray from the paved road when necessary. But there was a fundamental difference with the Quattro, which used its sophisticated suspension and tires, low ground clearance and high-powered engines to keep them on the road under hard driving.

Nearly all the early 4WD sedans used a four-wheel-drive system that was only used when it was required. This "in or out" system was the simplest and the cheapest, but it limited the occasions on which four-wheel drive could be used because of the absence of a central differential. The center differential—or the disengagement of the four-wheel drive system—was needed for road use because the front and rear wheels of any vehicle describe different arcs while cornering and must therefore rotate at different speeds. The "in and out" system was therefore of less interest for high-performance road cars of the 1980s.

The problem of the speed difference between the two axles led to some unusual solutions among the many proposed, including the use of four-wheel steering. This gave the two axles a similar cornering radius and had been used most often on commercial vehicles, starting with the FWD wagon of 1904. In Porsche's experimental 911 Turbo 4x4, another method was chosen: the drive shaft to the front wheels incorporated a free-wheel mechanism, allowing the front wheels to rotate at a higher speed than those at the rear during cornering. However, when this happened, they were not transmitting the engine's torque.

Audi chose to use permanent four-wheel drive, with a central differential and a rear differential that could be locked by the driver at will. Locking the center differential is recommended on slippery surfaces, and in order to extract the maximum from the car on difficult terrain, the rear axle could also be locked. This action had its effect on the car's handling, however, causing understeer characteristics that were almost impossible to overcome in the case of an error by the driver. In the case of the competition model, Michele Mouton and her colleagues had to resort to a fair degree of acrobatic agility to get the car sideways when it was necessary. It is for this reason that Audi tried a limited-slip rear differential instead of the manually operated 100-percent lock-up device.

#### In Search of the Ultimate - The Peugeot 205 Turbo 16

The majority of early 4WD cars, including the Quattro, used a 50/50 split, which was about right when you consider the weight transfer that takes place during heavy acceleration. The Lancia Delta Turbo 4x4 had a 58-percent front and 42-percent rear torque split, which reflected the vehicle's weight distribution. A purist, however, would probably prefer 40 percent of the torque to the front, in order to avoid overloading the steering wheels, and 60 percent to the rear, where weight is transferred during acceleration. To balance this split, he would mount the engine in a center/rear position to give the right weight distribution. The result of his work would be the Peugeot 205 Turbo 16.

Of course, Peugeot sacrificed all to efficiency, with no concessions to passenger space or economy in construction or operation. The 205 Turbo 16 was a two-seater, built purely and simply to win rallies, while Audi was using rallies to prove the efficiency of a system that was applicable to its entire range. In order to homologate the 205 Turbo 16 for international competition, Peugeot had to build at least 200 of the 200-horsepower bolides. The Peugeot's engine was mounted transversely, ahead of the rear axle, and the torque split could be varied from 25/75 to 45/55 by changing the pinions in an epicyclic differential.

This worked in the same fashion as a normal differential, but all its pinions revolved in the same plane. Engine torque was transmitted to the planetary gear carrier, and the planet gears engaged on a central sun gear and an internally-toothed crownwheel. The difference in torque output was dependent upon the difference in diameter between the central sun gear and the crownwheel. The differential was developed for Peugeot by FF Developments Ltd, formerly Harry Ferguson Research.

#### The Inconveniences of Four-Wheel Drive

The increased weight of a 4x4 system inflicts a penalty in terms of fuel economy. On the highway, where the influence of the extra weight is less noticeable, thanks to the reduced need for acceleration and deceleration, a four-wheel-drive car can show a marginal improvement in consumption unless it is driven at maximum speed. The reason for the improvement is that driven wheels exert a lower rolling resistance than those which are being pulled or pushed. At maximum speed, however, the mechanical losses inherent in the more complicated drive-line make themselves felt in terms of fuel consumption.

The disengagement of one set of driving wheels, a standard feature of most of the off-road sedans of the 1980s, gave little to no savings in fuel because the weight still had to be moved and the disconnected differential and drive shafts still continued to turn, being driven by the cars forward motion rather than directly by the engine. To counter this latter problem, early off-road designs usually incorporated a freewheel mechanism in the front hubs that worked when the drive was disconnected; but the weight, however, was still present.

Things changed rapidly over the next twenty years, and one manufacturer was to claim the high ground in 4WD technology, applying this to all models in their lineup (albeit re-branding it as All-Wheel Drive). Performance manufacturers soon realized the benefits of being able to put the power down on the road outweighed the weight penalty. Of course, the large true off-road vehicle evolved into an entirely different beast, the vast majority never venturing outside the city, and mainly spotted picking up the kids from school.

# SPRING THINGS TO DO TO FIGHT OFF THE WINTER BL

Hey folks, are you tired of the winter blues? I'm sure most of you are ready for the warmer weather so you can turn the page on winter. Well, here are a few ideas to get you started on some spring preparations.



Shed Hunting- With the snow levels dropping or even gone in some areas, it's a good time to hit the woods and find a few whitetail-shed antlers.



Here some tips to getting started. There are many variables on when you should start shed hunting. Weather, drop in testosterone, health of deer and nutrition are the main reasons that cause a deer to



Extreme cold or snow can put a lot of stress on bucks and when that happens, it can slow down the animals and make them drop their antlers guicker.

Once the rut is over, testosterone levels in bucks start to decline. Testosterone levels decline and cells that are called osteoclasts (located at the base of each antler) absorb calcium, which creates pits that separate the antler from the pedicle.

In an ideal situation, with a healthy deer, available nutrition, and great weather, deer would shed their antlers at nearly the same time each year. However, this is never the case. If a deer is injured, the process is sped up because energy is diverted to other parts of the body instead of the antlers.



Fishing Gear- The warm fishing season is over, and you put up your rods and reels, tackle boxes and other gear you may use. Did you prep your gear for storage? Hopefully you did. Let's assume here now that you just put your gear in the garage, storage shed or basement. First priority is your rod and reels. Inspect your rods for abrasions, scratches or cracks. Then check your reel seat; does it tighten and loosen with ease. Check all your eyes to make sure the ferrules are still intact and not split.

Take your reels and check them for proper operation. Do they wind freely? Is there a gritty sound when you do? If they have any issues, you may have to open them up, and clean and re-lube them. Throw away your old line and get new. Old line will dry out and lose its flexibility. If your spools come off after winding new line, soak the spools with line in lukewarm water This helps moisten the line and take the kinks out that always come with new line.

Lures must be checked for rusty hooks and cracks. I like to replace old treble hooks with new and sharpen all others. Empty and clean out your box and reorganize it. I see too many guys fighting with their tackle early season every year.

Boats have their own issues to deal with and would take a whole article by themselves, so we won't go



Morel Mushroom Hunting- Morel mushroom hunting is a fickle venture, but very rewarding if you get into a few good spots. They make the wild game you harvest taste even better when cooked properly.

They are the American mushroom as they are widespread and plentiful, easy to identify, and they come up in the spring, giving people a reason to get out and enjoy warm weather after a long winter. Morels live on the edge of forest areas around ash, aspen, elm, and oak trees. Early in the spring as the ground is warming, you'll find them on south-facing slopes in fairly open areas. As the season progresses, go deeper into the woods and onto north-facing slopes.



Well-drained, sandy soils around creek bottoms make good hunting spots. You'll find the first morels of the year when daytime highs reach the 60s and lows stay above 40 degrees. Morels often grow around dead and dying trees. Old apple orchards are good grounds to check. When a tree reaches the stage of decay where the bark is slipping off its trunk. you'll often find lots of morels around it.

In early season, the morels are small; as the season progresses, they get bigger and easier to spot.

If you doubt how good they are, try them. They garner up to \$20 a pound in some locations






Hi, My name is Fred Speer, and I live in Birch Run, Michigan. Some of you might know me as "Goat Man".

# IN THE SHOP WITH RON

No, this isn't an advertisement for daylight savings time. This month in the shop we're going to go through the procedures I use and recommend for getting the bikes out of storage and ready for the upcoming riding season. These are the procedures I use on our own personal bikes.

The first thing I do is remove the battery maintainer and check the motor oil and visually look the bike over for any obvious issues or problems. If all appears well, I like to start the bikes and allow them to get completely warm; if the weather allows, I prefer to ride the bikes for a few miles to allow the transmission and primary to get up to normal operating temperature. While completely warm, I drain the oil from all three cases. When draining oil, remove either the dip stick (transmission and crank case) or the derby cover (primary) before removing the drain plug. This allows oil to drain completely from the case. Once the oil is drained down for the most part, remove the oil filter. Don't be afraid to give it ample time to drain—oil moves slowly. This will help remove any condensation that may have formed during storage.



While the oil is draining, it's a good time to service the air filter. If you have a reusable proper cleaning and/or oiling. If it's not a reusable filter, now is a time to determine if it needs to be cleaned or replaced. With

the air filter off, we can inspect the throttle cables, fuel hoses/fuel injector wiring, etc. for any cracks, splits, dry rot, and rodent damage.

Next, we can go to the primary side and adjust the clutch hub and cable. While the clutch cable is loose. I disconnect the cable from the clutch lever and lubricate the cable. They have a specialty tool just for this procedure that works very well. Depending on the year and model of the motorcycle, we need to check the tension on the primary chain and adjust if necessary. With the primary chain, and clutch hub and cable adjusted properly, we can reinstall the primary drain plug, inspection cover, and refill with the proper amount of oil (refer to manufacture specs) and reinstall the derby cover.



Then we can replace the drain plug in the transmission and crank case, and refill.

Now I start from the bottom and check anything and everything I can think of. Look things over closely; check the tires for tread depth, uneven or excessive wear, check the side walls closely for any signs of excessive cracking or splitting. Looks rims over closely; pot holes have a way of taking their toll. If you have spoked rims, check for bent. broken or missing spokes. With magnesium or chrome rims, check for damage corrosion or peeling/flaking chrome, especially around the sealing area. If all looks good, make sure tire pressure is correct. Now is a good time to check brake pads, front and rear. I like to lift the wheel off the ground and spin the tire and operate the respective front or rear brake; listen for any metal-onfilter, follow manufacturer's instructions for | metal sounds, squeaking, etc. And make sure the brake releases properly. Disc brake calipers have a tendency to get sticky during storage.

As part of my normal maintenance schedule, I change brake fluid every other year. Brake fluid, by its very nature, absorbs moisture. When new, brake fluid is clearthe more moisture it absorbs, the darker it gets, which is why it needs to be changed on a semiannual basis.

Next on the list are the front forks. Check seals for leaks, tears, etc. Check the steering head bearings for excessive play or binding; with front wheel off the ground, turn the handlebars from full right to full left. As with brake fluid, I change my fork oil at least every other year.

Next, I like to check the rear shocks for leaks, worn bushings and proper air pressure (if they are air shocks.) Now we can check the drive belt and pulleys for missing or damaged teeth and splits, cracks, or signs of dry rot on the belt. We also need to check the drive belt for proper tension and alignment and adjust as necessary. Check all lights, turn signals, emergency flashers, brake lights, headlight, tail light. Check to be sure the brake light functions properly with either the front and/or rear brake indi-


Check the horn. Make sure the throttle operates smoothly and returns to idle properly. With all drain plugs and oil filter reinstalled and all cases filled with proper amount of oil, start the motorcycle and check for proper oil pressure and any leaks. Check battery cables for tightness and corrosion.

The only thing left to do at this point (unless I forgot something) is to detail the bike and that will be a subject for a future article.

#### 2 Bucks at Once

Every year I put a lot of time into scouting for deer. I like to pattern certain ones. Bow my eye on an eight-point—I called him "Moose." I put my tree stand up on the deer trai where I saw him the most.

I had different tree stands in different locations where I hunted. Also, the way the wind blows is very important to getting close to a deer, and if the wind is blowing the wrong way. I won't hunt it.

Finally the season started. On October 8, I got to my stand in the morning. I was carrying two arrows with me. Daylight was approaching and the sun was coming up; meanwhile, I had two raccoons fighting and making so much noise I thought I had wasted my time coming to this stand. Despite my urge to shoot them. I restrained myself. Finally they left.

It was around eight a.m. when I looked around the tree and saw "Moose" strutting down the trail, just like he owned the woods. He stopped broadside of me. I blew an arrow right through him and stuck it right in the ground. He kicked up and ran straight away from me. This was what I'd been waiting for! Still sitting in my stand, I heard a snap of a limb behind me. I looked up and I saw another eightpoint buck coming down the trail. I put my second arrow in my bow and as he go closer he walked up and sniffed the arrow. I pulled back my bow, and shot the arrow right through him. He took off running in the opposite direction of "Moose.

I'm still sitting in my stand, looking down at two arrows stuck in the ground, and I am thinking this is a HIGH you cannot buy. I got down and got on the blood trail of the first one: while I was following the trail. I found a drop antler from a

previous year. Proceeding down the trail, I could see my buck right away; I tagged him and went looking for the second one. Changed directions, and found deer #2.

In Michigan, you only get two buck tags. I filled both tags October 8 around 8:00 a.m. with two nice eight-points.




